Conference Update—Schedule and Topics

Interest in our international conference this July in Florida has been great, and our registration numbers continue to grow. **This year's theme is "GCI: Renewed in Christ."** Confirmed attendance now exceeds 900, and we have used over 90 percent of our room block at the conference hotel. We look forward to seeing all who can make it to our first denominational conference as Grace Communion International.

The registration fee for persons staying in the host hotel is \$59, and is \$109 for those staying elsewhere. **The last day to register for the conference is Wednesday, June 23.**

Main speakers and topics

Each day includes a time of praise and worship. A tentative schedule for the speakers is as follows:

Thursday: After opening remarks by Joseph Tkach, Dr. Gary Deddo will give a presentation titled "Sharing in Christ's Life and Ministry: Moving Beyond Burnout or Bitterness." After a break, Cathy Deddo will speak on "The Shape of Love: John 17." (For more details on our guest speakers, see the conference website.) In the afternoon, participants can choose between the Holy Land Experience Tour, or a variety of workshop topics.

Friday: Workshops will be offered in the morning. In the afternoon, Mike Feazell will speak on "Seated With Christ." Dr. Elmer Colyer will then give three presentations on Trinitarian renewal: 1) "Where Does It Come From? The Triune Source of Renewal," 2) "What Makes It Work? The Transformative Dynamic at the

Heart of Renewal," and 3) "What Does It Look Like? The Social Embodiment of Renewal."

Saturday: Ed Stetzer will speak in the morning on "Compelled by Love." After more workshops, Ed Stetzer will speak again, on "Living on Mission." Joseph Tkach will conclude the afternoon with a presentation called "GCI Yesterday and Tomorrow."

Sunday: The conference will close with a worship service in the morning, including a message from Dan Rogers, offering, and communion.

The navigation bar

Whenever the mouse is over one of the words in the navigation bar, the menu automatically expands to offer the user more choices.

Under "God" are these menu options: Who is Jesus? Who is the Holy Spirit? Why are humans in the image of God? and So what?

In the Media column, we list the audio-video program series we have: Speaking of Life, You're Included, GCI Together, Word From Our Sponsor, and Other videos.

Under Publications, we have Christian Odyssey, Together: GCI News, The Gospel, The Bible, Church and Ministry, Discipleship and Spiritual Growth, Old Testament Laws, Biblical Prophecy, and an alphabetical index.

Interactive map

Whenever the mouse is over one of the continents, the name of the continent is displayed, and if the mouse is clicked, the user will be taken to information on what the church is doing on that continent.

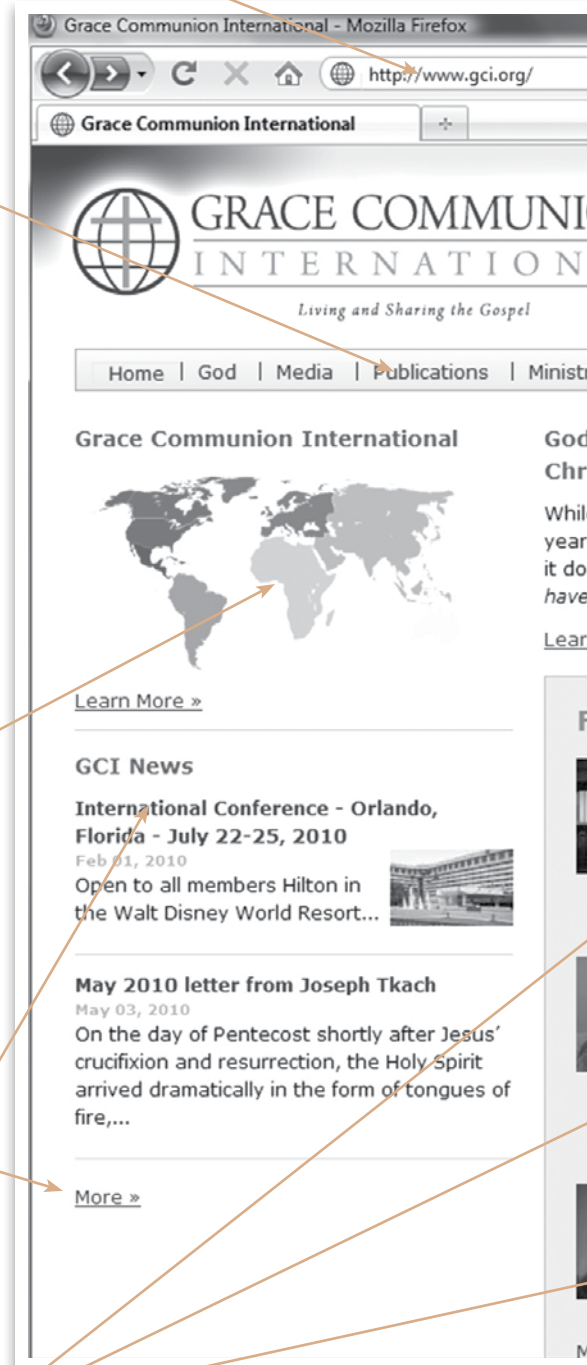
News block

Video programs

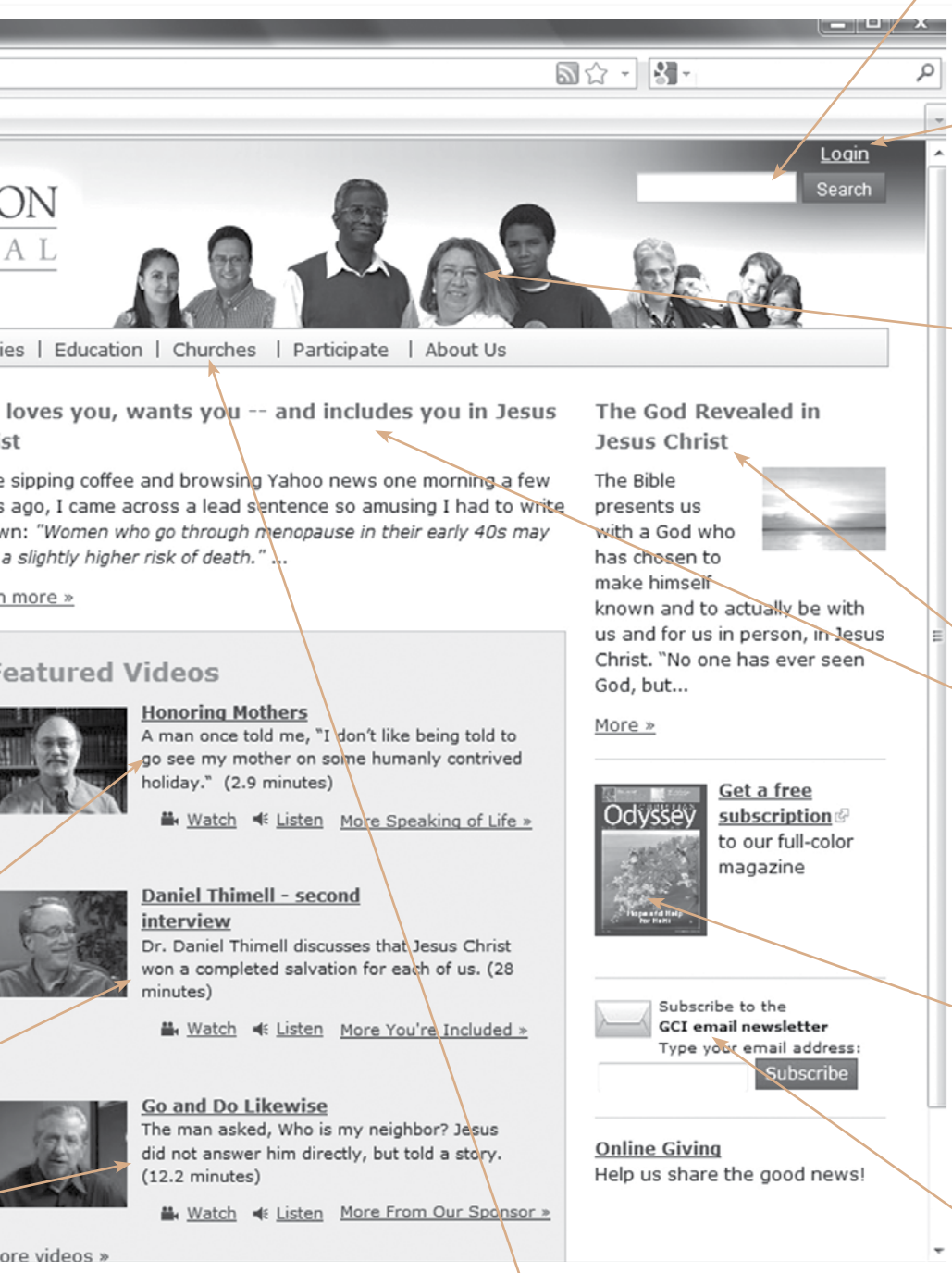

A Personal Care Pantry Ministry

Typically, effective ministries are born out of a particular need. Such is the case for the personal care pantry ministry of New Life in Christ, the GCI congregation we pastor in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

With unemployment at about 15 percent, and the rapid influx of immigrants into the city, many of Grand Rapids' families lack food, household goods and personal care items. Our personal care pantry ministry helps to meet these needs, and in doing so, shares with people the love and life of God.

We partner in this ministry with United Church Outreach Ministry.

Introducing IT LOOKS LIKE THIS...

With this issue, we introduce "It Looks Like This"—a new column in *Together*, and a new website at <http://gci-usa.blogspot.com/>. Both celebrate the journey of our U.S. churches from union to communion, making disciples with Jesus.

This journey involves our churches in what Jesus is doing within our communities to seek the lost; nurture believers; equip workers; and multiply leaders, ministries and churches. "It Looks Like This" tells and shows what that looks like in print (in *Together*) and in videos and pictures (in the online blog).

We invite you and your church to celebrate with us as we give thanks to the Father for including us in what he is doing, through his Son, in the Holy Spirit. And we invite you to tell your church's story in "It Looks Like This." For questions, assistance in writing, and to submit articles, contact Ted Johnston at Ted.Johnston@gci.org.

They distribute food, and send needy families our way for personal care items. When they come, we feed them a meal of chili. We're open once a month, staffed with about 20 volunteers from our church (which has about 40 members). A few non-member relatives and some teens from the community help us.

The beginning of this ministry goes back about six years. As a congregation, we were actively seeking a way to minister to the community where we were meeting. We wanted something that would work with our small size, and thus be sustainable over a long time. We were meeting in a beautiful hall in an affluent suburb. But we were not finding ways to connect with that community. So we began to shift our view. And after much prayer and discussion, we decided to relocate into the city.

I (Sam) took a first step by connecting with other city pastors. As a result, we were offered a meeting hall in a predominantly Hispanic neighborhood. I started developing



relationships with community leaders and began helping at a local food bank. One day, over coffee with the food bank director, our conversation turned to ministry needs in the

community. Out of this conversation came the idea for a personal care pantry ministry.

We began by serving 25 families each month. An early concern was bridging cultural and language differences. But it turned out not to be hard. The area children (mostly second-generation Americans) were eager to serve as Spanish-English translators. As friendships developed, cultural barriers



were transcended.

Our pantry ministry now serves about 125 families each month, representing over 500 people. We not only provide personal care items, we also receive prayer requests. In addition, we've helped several area children attend a GCI Generations Ministries camp.

Two years ago, we realized that our pantry ministry needed to move from cultivating to planting. We were cultivating friendships, but we wanted to be more active in sharing the gospel with these friends. And so we started a Vacation Bible School (VBS) with the children of the pantry families. Twenty children attended the first year, and 40 the second. The second year some of the older children helped run the VBS. And now two of the children regularly attend our church.

Last year we began involving pantry families in pantry operations. This has worked well because people often feel bad about receiving help—now they can both give and receive.



Also, sharing pantry operations provides greater opportunity for our members to build relationships with pantry families.

Clearly, our pantry is filling a significant community need. But it's also greatly benefitting our congregation.

The first benefit is ministry multiplication. I started the minis-

try, and then our outreach ministry leader stepped up to develop it. Then another member stepped up to become pantry director. This has allowed me to focus on other aspects of our outreach. One is my participation in Roosevelt Park Ministries, a faith-based organization that serves our focus community. I am now board president, and an elder, Harvey Wierenga, is a board member. This ministry recently conducted an extensive community assessment, helping us connect to the heartbeat of the community as we learn what they truly need.

A second benefit is partnerships with other community organizations. This has helped us become community-based. A side benefit is that our pantry is now nearly self-funded

through the financial support of outside ministry partners and friends.

A third benefit is the transformation of our congregation. The pantry has given our members a clearer understanding of what Jesus is doing, in the Spirit, to advance the Father's mission within our community. Our growing understanding of Trinitarian Incarnational theology and ministry is transforming both our thinking and acting. Our members are growing in their love for one another and for those outside our fellowship. Their commitment is high, and their financial support is up. And, we are having fun! We are learning that Jesus truly loves our community, and we love the fact that we are joining him in what he is already doing in our community.

Update on the Pastoral Internship Program

The new GCI Pastoral Internship program in the US is under way with the hiring of Cabner Virgile and Skyeler Lewkowicz. Cabner is being mentored by Paul David Kurts, pastor of the GCI congregation in Hickory, NC, and Skyeler is working alongside Tim Sitterley, pastor of the GCI congregations in Eugene and Salem, OR.

Cabner has been a member since January 1985. He enjoyed fellowship with the members in the New York City area for many years until he, his wife Maria and daughter

Laura moved to Statesville, NC, four years ago. Cabner says that he has GCI DNA running through his veins and is proud of it!

Cabner has served in different areas in the church over the years (worship leader, men's ministry

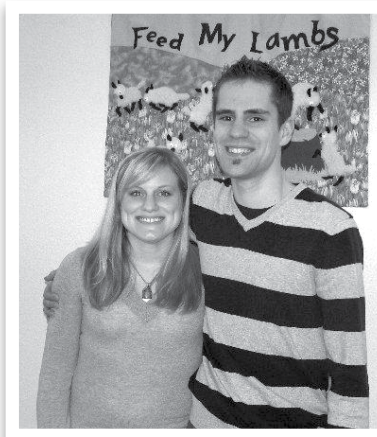
leader, small group leader, fund raising leader, etc.). Twelve years ago when Cabner sensed God's call to pastoral ministry, he went to school to build and sharpen the skills needed. He completed a Bachelor's in Theology, a Bachelor's in Religious Education, and is now working toward a Master's in Ministry, and has plans to pursue a doctorate.

On the last Saturday in March, I joined Paul David and Cabner at a men's

prayer breakfast. It was my first opportunity to meet Cabner, and interacting with him in the fellowship of the other men was a great blessing. Afterward Cabner and I spent some one-on-one time together and he shared his heart and unwavering dedication for

participation in the ministry of Jesus. He is leaning toward leading the start of a new church, but his internship will allow him to gain clarity around this vision. Some of the church members commented positively on Cabner's preaching ability, kidding that his accent gives him the credibility of a college professor.

Skyeler has a Bachelor of Arts in Pastoral Ministry from Northwest Christian University and plans to begin graduate studies. He has a

short history with GCI that began two years ago when he met Pastor Tim Sitterly through an internship for college credit. I met Skyeler on a recent visit to the Northwest. He says he greatly enjoys fellowship with GCI folks and fully embraces GCI's theology and doctrine.

My wife Susan and I joined Pastor Tim, Skyeler and the rest of the Living Hope Church in Salem, OR for Easter Sunday. I had the privilege of bringing Tim, his wife Linda, Skyeler and his wife Tracy forward in the service to pray for them, asking for God's guidance and blessing for the internship. Skyeler and his wife have a wide range of experience in Christian ministry, and their current desire is to work with a gathering of young adults within the context of the existing GCI congregation.

These two interns have a large age difference (Cabner turns 50 this year and Skyeler turns 25). However, they share the common traits of hearing God's call on their lives to ministry and they have both actively pursued education and experiences in response to that call. We are excited for them, and we ask for your prayers on their behalf as they move deeper into ministry with Jesus within GCI.

A new GCI congregation in North Carolina

Joy! Accomplishment! Challenge! Those were some of the feelings experienced on February 14 when the members of King of Kings Community Church (Kings Mountain, NC) heard that they would become a chartered congregation of Grace Communion International.

From the beginning we have clear-

ly seen this as a work of the Holy Spirit. God has provided every need. It all began in the spring of 2003 with a small group of 10 members of Church of the Living Waters GCI (Charlotte, NC). This group started meeting twice a month in Kings Mountain. Members of the group invited friends and family members to attend an outreach event in the fall of 2006. One month later they met, with invited friends and family members, for a Sunday worship service in a garage owned by one of the members.

For the first year, they met once per month. In November 2007, the group began to meet twice per month. During this time, pastoral and core members received training and guidance from Church Multiplication Ministries (CMM). Randy Bloom, CMM Director, encouraged the Kings Mountain group to develop as a multi-site church affiliated with the Charlotte congregation.

Meetings continued through August 2008, with attendance in the twenties. In September, the group began to meet in a larger rented building. Three months later, they began to meet each Sunday. Attendance has ranged from the twenties to thirties. Last year, seven attendees were baptized, and the church roll has increased to 50 people.

The congregation is focused on spiritual growth, disciple-making, leadership development, and outreach. Luke wrote concerning the

Jerusalem church in its beginning, "Everyone was filled with awe" (Acts 2:42). There is a similar sense in this new GCI congregation.

Pastor produces video about the homeless

When Luciano Cozzi (West Warwick, RI) became a part-time pastor, he had to find a second job. So that he could be available for members and their needs, he decided to start his own business: Cozzi Video Productions. Last year was a very slow year, but we decided instead of sitting still, we might be able to do something to help not only our community but also those around the country.

A conversation had taken place with someone who wanted to open a shelter. This person tried to get permission from the town but was turned down because they didn't want "those kind of people" in our

town. Of course all towns already have “those kind of people.”

With the contacts Luciano has from Leadership Rhode Island, we were able to interview heads of many of the departments and shelters in RI. We also spoke to the many who are or were homeless. Their pain and frustration was obvious and long-lasting. After a year of work, and with several of our church members as “extras,” *The Hidden Face of Homelessness* was finished.

It is being very well received around the state and is sold on Amazon.com. It has been used in many other states, such as CA, WA, IN, PA, MA, NY and will be included in the Insight Media Fall Catalog for schools around the country. It was aired on Rhode Island PBS on April 17-18, and they have a four-year contract to continue showing it.

Love Wichita Outreach: Twenty three members of Grace Fellowship, our congregation in Wichita, Kansas, participated in Love Wichita on April 24. This outreach was comprised of nearly 40 churches around the city representing several denominations. Love Wichita is an annual event in which churches share Christ’s love in action by completing service projects at homes, schools, and city parks in the community. This year, our congregation did outside cleanup, yard work and painting at the home of an elderly, disabled woman.
