
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As Christians, we are called to participate actively with Jesus in his ministry to multiply his disciples. Most of us are acquainted with what he is doing within the church. But what is Jesus doing among the *unchurched*?

Some unchurched people attended church in the past, but stopped. Others never attended. Some unchurched people are favorably inclined toward the church, but an increasing number see the church as irrelevant or even harmful.

So, back to my question: What is Jesus doing among the unchurched? And that raises a related question: How may we participate?

We see Jesus leading many unchurched people to a point of spiritual openness. Though many never think of attending church, many do desire to discuss matters of faith.

At the same time, we see Jesus leading evangelistically minded believers to form small groups that reach out to and include spiritually open, unchurched people. In GCI, we desire to equip some of our members to form and facilitate such groups. We call them *FaithTalk groups*. These evangelistic small groups are led by a couple of members (of any age), who invite into the group unchurched friends, neighbors, family, coworkers, fellow students, etc.

Because FaithTalk groups are designed to connect with unchurched people, they often begin as social gatherings, centered on a hobby, sport, vocation or other area of shared interest. How about a motorcycle-riding group? Or a 500 card game group? The possibilities are endless, but the goal is the same: to provide a safe place where relationships are built and meaningful discussion is engendered. Within such places, opportunity arises to begin talking about matters of faith. Throughout, Jesus is present in the Spirit and over time, opportunity arises for the group's facilitator(s) to make Jesus and his gospel known.

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## FaithTalk goals

Our primary goal in providing resources for starting and facilitating *FaithTalk groups* is to equip GCI congregations with a helpful tool to assist them in connecting with unchurched people. A secondary goal is to provide a means for identifying people within our congregations who have skills and passions that may indicate a call from God to plant a new GCI church. Either way, *FaithTalk* is about evangelism and multiplication—key aspects of sharing in what Jesus is doing in the Spirit in and through his church.

## FaithTalk resources

GCI Church Administration and Development provides various resources to help interested members form and facilitate a FaithTalk group.

- 2. Video training lessons with downloadable training guides. These lessons are designed to help you form and facilitate a *FaithTalk group*.

Training lesson #1 has a special message for church pastors. It is our recommendation that the pastor be actively involved in starting a *pilot FaithTalk group* within his or her congregation. In that way, he or she will gain personal experience with the use of this tool, and show support for the training of other facilitators and the starting of other *FaithTalk groups*.

Right now, there are eight training lessons. More will be added in the future. You can stream the videos on the *FaithTalk equipper* site, or download them from the internet (most are posted on YouTube) and watch them elsewhere.
