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Catalyzing Christian Community

As we look toward a new year, a fruitful leadership exercise is to gather your team to consider what you will do in 2013 to join with Jesus as he works in the world, through the Spirit, to gather God's children into *Christian community*.

Eric Byrant, in a recent Eli Church Planting blog post, refers to this as "catalyzing community" (read his post at www.elichurchplanting.com/2011/12/7-ways-to-catalyze-community/). I like his way of viewing ministry as fundamentally relational and community-oriented, and his definition of the outcome of ministry as helping people experience what the Apostles Creed calls "the communion of saints." Though Christian community is not the source or cause of our salvation (only God saves), it is within Christian community that people experience and thus are enabled to live out the salvation they have in Christ.

So what will you and your congregation be doing in 2013 to be a church that reaches out to draw into Christian community those children of God not yet in such community, and then help those who are "grow deeper"? Bryant offers the following seven principles (which I have adapted slightly):

Cause creates community

Do your leaders and members understand that a focus on God's mission (our "cause" as Christians) powerfully creates (catalyzes) community? A shared mission draws people together!

Meet the needs of those around you

Does your congregation seek to meet the physical, emotional, economic and spiritual needs of those around you? Does the environment you provide facilitate change in the individuals you are reaching? A key issue for every congregation is having clarity concerning their outreach "focus group."

Reach out with hospitality

Hospitality means loving strangers. A similar word, "hospice," means "a safe place." Are our homes, businesses and churches safe places where strangers experience kindness and love?

Develop authentic friendships

Are we loving, serving and influencing our family, neighbors, co-workers and friends? Jesus was a "friend of sinners"—willing to ruin his reputation to reach out to others who were far from God.

Allow people to first belong, then believe and become

Are we allowing our convictions to become a litmus test for friendship? Or are we joining with Jesus in actively pursuing friendships with all sorts of people – including those with whom we may disagree. The message we want to send to people is this: "Come as you are, and you don't have to stay that way!"

Multiply leaders for the harvest

In raising up new leaders (including your own replacement) do you think in terms of leaders who will be able to catalyze community with people beyond your church? Make decisions based on who is not yet here rather than simply who has been here the longest.

A related resource that we in CAD find quite helpful in addressing these issues is the book *Transformational Church* by Ed Stetzer and Thom Rainer. We urge you to read it in 2013 if you have not done so already. We also recommend *Missional (joining God in the neighborhood)* by Alan Roxburgh.

May your journey with Christ in 2013 be fruitful in blessing many!
