



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

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Spiritual formation

Dear assistant to the Great Physician of our souls:

This month many of us will participate in the WCG international elders' conference in Southern California where the focus will be on *spiritual formation*. This issue of *GC2 equipper* addresses this vital topic to prepare us for the conference and to remind us that spiritual formation is the primary work of Christian ministry.

It's easy to loose focus on this essemtial work. Some wrongly seek after 'success' equated with attendance. But this can be a discouraging dead-end. According to *BuildingChurchLeaders.com*, eight out of ten pastors will never lead a church with more than 150 people attending. Many of you reading this are pastors numbered among that 80%. Perhaps this is discouraging to you and to others who minister with you. If so, read on.

BuildingChurchLeaders.com asks an important related question: In an era that places so much emphasis on church size, how do we measure a truly 'successful ministry? In answer it offers an excerpt from Building Your Church through Counsel and Care where author Eugene Peterson defines a pastor's success not as 'running the church' but as faithfully offering 'the cure of souls.' He acknowledges that a pastor must deal well with the leadership and administrative work of running a church. But he emphasizes that a pastor's primary focus must be the spiritual formation of people (what Peterson calls the 'cure [or care] of souls'). It is here that Peterson locates true pastoral success.

As Peterson implies, this is not an 'either/or' proposition (either run the church or care for souls). Rather it involves maintaining clear priorities—something like the challenge faced by fathers and mothers. They must run a household well (various chores and responsibilities); but their primary calling (and true measure of success) is building a home.

May God encourage and otherwise equip you to be faithful in caring for the souls in the part of his 'household of faith' where he has placed you. *GC2 equipper* and the MinDev team are here to help.

Q&A: Ministry tips and resources concerning spiritual formation

Q: What is the theological underpinning of spiritual formation?

A: We are spiritually formed as we experience and participate in the love and life of our triune God: Father, Son and Spirit. This participation is the realization and responsive outworking of the place humanity now has with God in Christ.

This theology of grace is grounded in the biblical doctrine of the adoption of humanity into the life of the Trinity through Jesus' incarnation, life, death, resurrection and ascension. In Jesus (who is uniquely and fully God and human), humanity is now reconciled to God. As believers, we have come to know and trust in the giver of this grace. And now, through the Spirit, we grow in our participation in the life that is ours in Christ. This growth is God's work in us, but we are called and enabled by the Spirit to participate actively.

God has granted to the WCG an understanding of this trinitarian theological vision through years of doctrinal reform. The vision is beautifully described by Baxter Kruger in "The Great Dance" and in his organization's website at www.perichoresis.org/. Baxter will be a presenter at the WCG international elders' conference this month. This same trinitarian theology is 'unpacked' systematically in "Invitation to Theology" by Michael Jinkins.

We find the theology presented in these resources to be faithful to what God has shown us in the Holy Scriptures. We therefore recommend them to you and also suggest you read our WCG Odyssey article, "Why Study Theology"—it's posted online at www.christianodyssey.org/god/theology.htm.


Q: As a minister, how can I help others be formed in Christ?

A: We minister out of the overflow of the life of Christ formed within us. We have nothing to give but what he gives us. And therefore our spiritual formation as ministers is of great importance. This truth is helpfully expounded in a book reviewed here by WCG pastor Tom Kennebeck.

In "Jesus the Pastor" author and pastor John W. Frye communicates the importance of a pastor being in spiritual fellowship with Christ, and through that fellowship, as Christ's under-shepherd, leading others to God. This fellowship involves being yoked to Jesus: "Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls" (Matt. 11: 29). Jesus is saying to us, "Connect with me for learning and training. Imitate me in all you do. I will be next to you, the wiser, stronger, seasoned one who will impart to you all that I am."

Frye asks, "How seriously do pastors look to Jesus Christ as the one who shapes their vision and expression of pastoral ministry?" At times, we can be so focused on agendas and programs that we fail to look to the Chief Shepherd in fulfilling our ministry calling. Of course, there is nothing wrong with agendas and programs, but we must not get 'the cart before the horse.' Only as we "fix our eyes on Jesus," the one who leads and empowers the church, will we be effective leaders in the service of Christ's body, the church.

As ministers, our relationship with God needs to be intimate and personal—one where the Spirit forms Christ in us. For this to happen, it is necessary to be actively engaged in the spiritual disciplines, which create 'space' in our minds, hearts and time for God to work. As an example of creating this 'space,' Frye urges every pastor to be involved in a small worshipping, caring and praying support group.

A: We recommend the following:





Participants explore basic concepts related to developing a personal prayer life, effective Bible study, personal and corporate worship, discovering their spiritual "SHAPE", a holistic approach to service, and maintaining priorities.
