# Q: What are some WCG Next critical concerns?

# A: One is reaching out to all generations; young adults included.

Because God is concerned, our *WCG Next* vision embraces <u>all</u> agegroups: children, teens and young adults through senior adults. We seek to join with Jesus in ministering to, with and through these agegroups in *intergenerational* ways. Doing so is not easy. Each presents particular challenges—but in all cases, our principal questions are:

- What is Jesus doing among them?
- How may we participate with him?

We're asking these important questions concerning young adults. Though answers are not always easy to find, we're assured that the Spirit is moving in their midst and wants to involve us in two ways:

- Help young adults discover the connection that is theirs with the triune God in Jesus Christ.
- Help young adults find joy and purpose through active participation with Jesus in ministry in and through the church.

The pressing need for ministry to, with and through young adults is made clear in a recent USA Today article:

Protestant churches are losing young adults in *sobering* numbers, a survey finds. Seven in 10 Protestants ages 18 to 30...who went to church regularly in high school said they quit attending by age 23, according to the survey by LifeWay Research. And 34% of those said they had not returned, even sporadically, by age 30. That means about one in four Protestant young people have left the church....

"This is sobering news that the church needs to change the way it does ministry," says Ed Stetzer, director of Nashville-based LifeWay Research, which is affiliated with the publishing arm of the Southern Baptist Convention. "It seems the teen years are like a free trial on a product. By 18, when it's their choice whether to buy in to church life, many don't feel engaged and welcome," says associate director Scott McConnell...

The survey found that those who stayed with or returned to church grew up with both parents committed to the church, pastors whose sermons were relevant and engaging, and church members who invested in their spiritual development.

"Too many youth groups are holding-tanks with pizza. There's no life transformation taking place," Stetzer says. "People are looking for a faith that can change them and to be a part of changing the world."

# Q: How do we connect with young adults?

### A: Think intergenerational community.

A hunger for authentic community is huge for young adults (age 18-34). This is confirmed by LifeWay in research posted on their *Threads* website. Here's an excerpt:

"When our LifeWay team went out to study Young Adult Ministry in churches, we had thought Community might be the highest priority. But we had no idea to what extent it occupied the top spot. Seventy-three percent of [young adult] church members and 47 percent of young adults outside the church told us community with other young adults is extremely important in their lives. That's true of every generation, but it is particularly true of people in the 18 to 34 age group."

Such community, though an important goal, can't be created by fiat or through mere programs. It must be "real"—developed organically through the Spirit's work.

So what can we do? Provide *environments* where authentic community forms. What does that look like? Ask some young adults. You may learn that many yearn for *intergenerational* community that values them as young adults, gives them opportunities to "hang" with peers, and provides learning opportunities and leadership roles shared with older adults.

We don't have all the answers—but by God's grace we're learning. And a lot of that learning is coming through our GenMin camp experience. These camps (16 and growing) are a vital part of our journey to WCG Next. Thanks to the many who are helping our camps thrive as *incubators* of intergenerational community. Keep up the good work!
